You can use this Summer to explore the media and expand your experience – try out new and different media products (TV/films/newspapers/magazines/music videos/adverts/games/etc) instead of what you usually stick to!

Please explore the following tasks:

Work to complete

Try our One-Month Media Film & TV Challenge! Over the next 30 days, try to complete all ten of the following:

- (1) A film in a language other than English
- (2) At least one episode of a TV show in a language other than English
- (3) A female-led (actor/director/writer) film or TV show
- (4) A film or TV show that offers an ethnically-diverse experience
- (5) At least one episode of a TV show made before 1980 (try YouTube)
- (6) A film made in the 1980s
- (7) A film made in the 1970s
- (8) A film made in the 1960s or before
- (9) Download BBC Sounds and listen to a podcast on a topic or pastime you enjoy (e.g. F1, true crime etc.).
- (10) A news report on a current event from two contrasting sources (BBC R1 and R4, Sky and GB News etc.)

Try to read a variety of newspapers and magazines, not just your usual one, especially Daily Mirror and The Times. Buy and read a copy of *Vogue* and *The Big Issue* magazine.

Over the Summer, start exploring and collecting media resources that you find interesting, e.g. examples of print adverts (including video games), music videos and film posters – you could refer to these as examples later.
