Welcome to the BTEC National in Early Childhood Development! This exciting course is perfect for anyone interested in working with babies and young children, supporting their growth, learning, and wellbeing. Whether you want to become a teacher, nursery practitioner, play therapist, paediatric nurse—or simply understand more about how children develop—this subject will give you the knowledge and confidence to take the next step.

Some of these units will have traditional exams ('External' assessments), whereas others will be more like coursework ('Internal' assessments).

Children in England growing up 'sedentary, scrolling and alone' ([The Guardian](#))

Published in The Guardian, this article highlights a year-long study by the Raising the Nation Play Commission showing a dramatic decline in children's outdoor play. Experts warn this trend harms physical health, mental wellbeing, and social development.

What challenges might local authorities or developers face when trying to implement a "play sufficiency duty"?

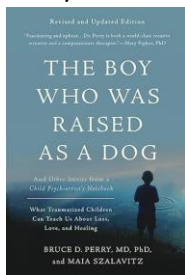

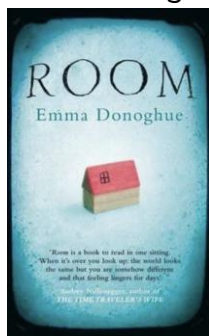
Books

"The Boy Who Was Raised as a Dog"
by Dr. Bruce Perry and Maia Szalavitz



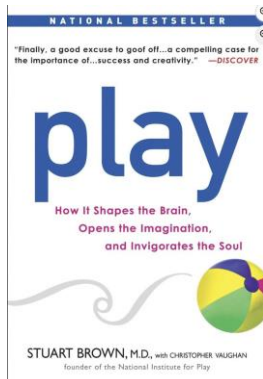
This accessible book shares real-life case studies of child trauma and development. It links closely with Unit 1 (Children's Development) and Unit 2 (Safeguarding), showing how early experiences impact emotional and brain development. It introduces ideas about attachment, resilience, and care in a compelling way.

"Room" by Emma Donoghue



Told from the point of view of a 5-year-old boy, this novel highlights how the environment shapes language, social, and emotional development (Unit 1). It provides a powerful, fictional insight into delayed development and safeguarding concerns, connecting with Unit 2 and the importance of early intervention.

"Play: How It Shapes the Brain, Opens the Imagination, and Invigorates the Soul" by Dr. Stuart Brown



Ideal for Unit 3 (Play and Learning), this book explains the science behind why play matters. It's readable, full of examples, and helps students see that play is essential for learning—not just something fun. It helps them value the professional role of play in development.

Films and TV Shows

Babies (Netflix Documentary Series)



This two-part science documentary explores the first year of life—from motor skills and brain development to social interaction. Directly connects to Unit 1 (Children's Development) and illustrates real-life observation and developmental milestones.

There She Goes (BBC iPlayer)



A poignant comedy-drama about raising a child with a learning disability. Offers real insight into early development, family support, and professional roles like A-child psychologists and SEN support.

A Special School (BBC iPlayer)



This documentary explores everyday life in a specialist school setting. It brings safeguarding, inclusive practice, and multi-agency working to life.

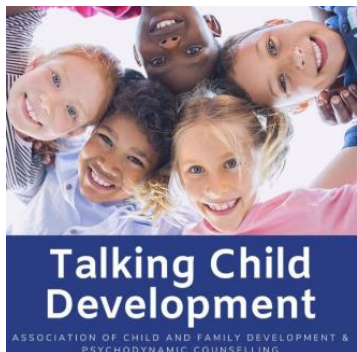
One Born Every Minute (BBC iPlayer)



A factual series filmed in maternity wards. It gives real-life insight into childbirth, bonding, early infant care, and professional roles like midwives and health visitors. Fantastic for connecting theory to real-world practice and observing key moments in early development and early parenting support.

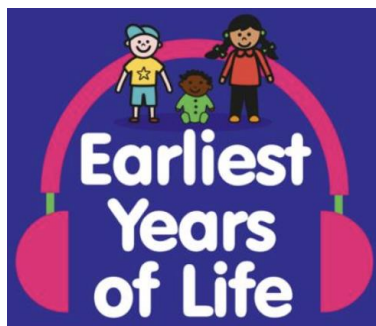
Podcasts
