# Subject mind-set and BIG picture thinking...

Your History A Level course will take you on a journey through new topics, new people and very interesting debates. You will be familiar with the topic of the USA in the 20th century from GCSE where we have a strong focus on Civil Rights. However, there will be new discoveries to be made about Britain and the political issues that embroiled the 19th-20th centuries — with various protests, radical reformers and political unrest.

Preparation reading and task:

#### YEAR 12 PAPER 1 BRIDGING WORK TASK:

Our course starts in 1918, and explores different ways that Britain changed up to Margaret Thatcher's premiership. For example- how the government changed, welfare, education, society etc

Before we start, you will need strong knowledge of what **Britain was like at the beginning of the course.** 

Your task will be:

- Research Late Victorian/ Edwardian (up to 1918) Britain. Start by buying Martin Pugh's State and Society the 4th Edition can be bought for as little as £3-£4 online. Start on Part 2 (Chapters 7-10). There are also many extra reading recommendations below. Make notes as you go.
- 2. You will then need to answer the following question; (typed or handwritten are both fine)

# "What was British Society like in 1918?"

You will need to make reference to

- What was the state of politics? Who was in power? (Labour, Liberal, Conservative parties)
- What were people's attitudes towards poverty, class, women ,workers , the empire?
- What effect had WW1 had on Britain?

You will need to write **approx.1000 words**, or 2 sides of A4 typed (likely much longer if hand written). Suggested organisation:

- -Introduction (50-100 words)
- -3 paragraphs ( $\sim$ 250 words each) on 3 different aspects (see above- you do not need to include every suggested topic).
- A conclusion ( $\sim 150$  words).

You will need to have this completed, and ready to hand in on the first week of term

The BBC series Andrew Marr's The Making of Modern Britain is normally on YouTube. Episodes 1-3 give you some good background about Britain between 1900 and 1918, helping to prepare you for the starting point (1918) of the course itself.
